IMPORTANT INFORMATION

24-Credit Rule

This rule requires students to take at least 24 [elective credits](#) outside of their program and department.

Deficiencies

Deficiencies are courses that a student did not complete in their prior studies but are necessary to meet the degree requirements at the university. **Please refer to your [offer of admission](#) for any listed deficiencies.**

Electives

Electives can be completed by selectively choosing courses of interest or by completing [elective groupings](#). An elective grouping is an interdisciplinary cluster of courses based on a particular theme (business, culture, law, etc.)

Equivalencies

Econ 221: Students who have received credit for BIOL 322, COMM 215, DESC 244, ENGR 371, GEOG 362, MAST 221 or 333, PSYC 315 or 316, SOCI 212 and 213, or STAT 249 or 250 may not take this course for credit.

NOTE: *Students in the Major in Economics are required to take ECON 221. Credits earned from SOCI 212 or INTE 296 will not be counted towards the degree.*

Econ 222: Students who have received credit for MAST 333, PSYC 316 or STAT 250, or for any combination of MAST 221 and 333, PSYC 315 and 316, or STAT 249 and 250, may not take this course for credit.

Econ 325: Students who have received credit for MAST 234 or MATH 251 may not take this course for credit.

Econ 326: Students who have received credit for MAST 235, MATH 252 or 283 may not take this course for credit.

General Education

In conjunction with the 24-credit rule, the General Education rule requires students to take at least six (6) credits, of the 24 credits, outside of their program and sector, from either one or two sectors (Humanities, Social Science, or Sciences). Minimum number of credits

The minimum number of credits required to complete a degree varies depending on the basis of admission. Students are required to complete 90, 108, or 120 accumulated credits based on program (Major, Specialization, Honours) requirements and electives.

Residence Requirement:

You must complete a minimum of 50% of your core courses, and your degree, at Concordia University. You must also complete the last 45 credits of your degree at Concordia University.
