

Understanding your Offer of Admission

- Degree (BA, BSc, BEd)/Certificate
- Program of study (Human Relations, Physics)
- Concentration (Specialization, Major, Minor)
- Minimum number of credits to earn degree (90, 108 or 120)/minimum number of credits to earn Certificate (30 credits)
- Exemptions (EX) are an acknowledgment of equivalent courses taken elsewhere – usually introductory level - cannot be taken for credit (indicated in offer of admission and on student record)

Transfer credits:

University transfer (you are coming from another post-secondary school)

You may have transfer credits

- Specified by discipline (MATH) or general (GENL)
- Are these courses applicable to your program? If so, use the Admission Transfer credit page for information on how to proceed
- Not all transfer credits need to be specified (okay to keep as GENL)
- Use the available <u>course</u> <u>descriptions</u> in the Undergraduate Calendar

French Baccalaureate (FB) and International Baccalaureate (IB)

You may have transfer credits

– no changes can be made – they stay as they are!

Incomplete DEC:

You may have credits transferred as GENL – no changes can be made – they stay as they are!

Finalizing TRCs should be completed as soon as possible

Deficiencies – Bachelor of Science: ECP/MEP Science profile courses

Language course (ESL 202, 204)

ECP – Extended Credit Program (120 credits)

Specific programs have additional course requirements

- ➤ Biology & Psychology: BIOL 201, PHYS 206 & 226
- Chemistry, Geography, Health, Kinesiology and Applied Physiology: BIOL 201, PHYS 206 & 226 (Environment Science add: MATH 204)
- Math & Physics: MATH 204, PHYS 206 & 226

Degree structure: 90, 108 (MEP) or 120 credits (ECP)

Transfer credits will count towards these minimums — could be towards program of study or electives!

Certificate structure: 30



Programs of study and their concentration(s): Specialization (60-66 credits), Major (36-45 credits), Minor (24-30 credits)? Concentrations are made up of courses from the 200-, 300- and 400-level in your program of study).



Electives? Number of credits will vary depending on concentration of program of study (courses can be taken from various levels if you have the prerequisites). In the case of ECP/MEP students, some of your electives may/will be degree or program profile courses.



Certificates: some Certificates have specific courses you need to take while others have more flexibility

Degree Requirements: General Education (Gen Ed) and the 24-credit rule

- Faculty broken down into three sectors:
 Humanities, Social Science and Sciences
 impacts General Education
 requirement
 - Gen. ed. can also be satisfied with courses from another Faculty (Fine Arts, JMSB, GSC)
- All courses have a four-letter designation (e.g., INTE) – important for 24 credit rule

General education and 24-credit rule

The Faculty of Arts and Science offers its students the opportunity to study programs of interest, with varying degrees of concentrations. In order for the Faculty to meet its objective of offering degrees that encourage "all students to explore beyond the boundaries of their programs and concentration" (Undergraduate Calendar), the Faculty has included the 24-credit and General Education rules as a part of its degrees.

General Education

In conjunction with the 24-credit rule, the General Education rule requires students to take at least six (6) credits, of the 24 credits, outside of their program and sector, from either one or two sectors (Humanities, Social Science, or Sciences). For more information on the sectors of the Faculty, and the General Education rule, please visit the Undergraduate Calendar.

24-Credit Rule

This rule requires students to take at least 24 elective credits outside of their program and department. In programs leading to professional accreditation or in programs that include at least 12 credits from another discipline, the 24-credit requirement can be reduced to 18 credits. 

This survey course provides an interdisciplinary overview of biopsychosocial patterns of development over the lifespan, from conception to death. 



Registration tips:

Register on time!!!!

Your registration date posted in your Student Centre, in February, in your Enrollment box.

New class schedule available first week of March – know your registration dates and deadline


Make sure you know what courses you need to meet program requirements

Many programs have course sequencing – meet with your department advisor to know the sequence!

Some courses are reserved for specific program students;— can make choosing electives challenging

Look for open <u>electives</u> – most students will need these! This list has courses with no prerequisites and are open to all students!

If you have exemptions/transfer credits – you cannot repeat them



Registration tips:



Put your name on waitlists, if necessary, but understand what that means!

Know how and when to withdraw from courses should you need to do so!

Go to the "How to Guides" (bottom of page) to learn how to add your name to the wait list or create a swap

When you register, register for the full academic year (summer, fall and winter)

Take program courses and electives – mix it up!

Consider number of courses/credits per term? Do you work? Do you have other responsibilities?

Should you be full-time (4-5 classes/term – 12-15 credits)? Always confirm your schedule after you register!

Review grades at the end of the term –understand any administrative notation attached to your grades (<u>Undergraduate Calendar</u> – Section 16)

Do you need to repeat any courses? Use the repetition rule, if you need it!

Use the academic tools at your disposal: INC, DEF, MED (refer to Undergraduate Calendar – Section 16)



After registration, things to think about!

- How will I make sure I am academically successful?
 - Go to class participate!
 - Go to professor student office hours
 - Connect with other students in your classes
- Where can I go for help?
 - See your <u>department advisor</u>
 - See an SAS advisor
 - Student Success Center
 - Study Skill workshops
 - Writing Assistants
 - <u>Learning Specialists</u>
 - Student Service Station
- How will I know if I am succeeding academically?
 - Learn about your **GPA** and how to calculate it
 - <u>Assessment</u> happens at the end of May
 - You'll be contacted if things don't go well....

Meet

Meet with your professor regularly! Meet with your advisor at least once a year! You can find their contact information!

Log

Log into your <u>Student Hub/Student Centre</u> weekly for notices/Download the FREE Office 365 from the Concordia Website – you'll get a Concordia email address

Access

Access Centre for Students with Disabilities office

Use

Use the <u>academic tools</u> at your disposal: INC (can't complete course work during the term, talk to your professor); DEF (you're sick and can't take your final exam, have an unexpected event take place)

Seek

Seek out <u>University Services</u> that you need to succeed! Student Success Center, Health Services, Counselling and Psychological Services....

Include

ALWAYS include your program of study, student ID# (available in your offer of admission) and full name with ALL university communication

Consent

Consent to release information to a 3rd Party

Participate

In new student activities: Prepare, Connect, Start and Explore
