1. Call to Order

The Chair called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

4. Business Arising from the Minutes of April 12, 2024

The Chair addressed business arising from the minutes in her remarks.

5. Chair's Remarks

The Dean enjoyed seeing those who attended the end of year reception the previous day.

Budget:

- The government-required university's plan to return to a balanced budget in 5 years, since it has been in a deficit for over 3 years, was approved by the government and the Board of Governors a few months ago. The University has achieved its goal of reducing expenses to reach a maximum deficit of \$35 Million this year. For the Faculty of Fine Arts, this represents a budget reduction of slightly over \$3 Million in expenses, which it has achieved by taking a close look at the credit envelope, opting for a staff hiring freeze for the year and applying other measures. There were also retirements and faculty members who left the university. The Dean thanked everyone for the efforts they made towards reaching this goal.
- The Règles Budgétaires is a document the government produces each year which details the grants the University will receive from the Ministry of Higher Education. The grant covers a mix of fixed costs and costs that are adjusted to the student registration numbers, and the disciplines in which they are studying. There are also special envelopes dedicated to renovation, technology and other things. It is clear from the first draft of the Règles Budgétaires the university recently received, that there is no reinvestment in education from the government. The grant of funds injected directly by the government to the Québec university network has been reduced by \$189 Million and Concordia and McGill universities are the most affected. Additionally, the claw back on international student and Canadian student tuition has increased by 50% to an estimated \$150 Million. This amount is taken mainly from Concordia and McGill universities to be redistributed across the network. With less government funding and with returning part of the tuition collected from students, it is estimated that

Concordia's budget for 2024-2025 is down 4.1% from last year, which represents \$38 Million. The Règles Budgétaires includes a special envelope that was created to help universities adapt to the new funding formula and claw backs but only the francophone universities are eligible, not Concordia and McGill. When asked by the government to comment on the draft, Concordia clearly commented on the discriminatory nature of the new measures.

- Although the registration numbers are not final, It is expected that the university will need to cut an additional \$35 Million and that the Faculty of Fine Arts will need to cut \$4-5 Million. FoFA is asking areas other than the academic and research sectors to make a bigger effort in reducing spending and it is looking at opportunities to grow revenues.
- The Faculty of Fine Arts's overall operating budget is composed of 97% salary costs and potential avenues for reducing costs are:
 - Taking a hard look at what is core to the FoFA mission, and at what actions could be paused, or given over to other areas in the university that have the appropriate expertise.
 - Asking Managers in all FoFA units have to put forward a plan to reduce their operating budget by 10%.
 - Optimizing course credit allocation.
 - Looking at the TA allocation formula to make sure it's equitable and transparent across departments.
 - Looking at underused spaces.
 - o Growing revenues by investing in program development and recruitment.
- Registration numbers are good in most departments and Mary Laliotis is to share registration data with the departments in the coming week.
- Meetings with the departments and units to support the collective plans, are ongoing.
- Denis Cossette, CFO and Anne Whitelaw, Provosts, will be hosting Budget Conversations in June and there will be one session dedicated to the Chairs. Summaries of these talks, and public information regarding Concordia's budget situation can be found on Financial Services' website.

Campus Unrest:

- The situation on campus has been relatively quiet and the university is having regular conversations with the CSU, the GSA and other student groups to ensure that there are minimal conflicts, and that students and protesters are safe. There have been a few clashes, when student protests became violent, disrupted events or classes, or infringed on others' academic freedom. When situations such as these arise, the conversation always begins with the Dean of Students, Nadia Hardy, Campus Safety or other interlocutors. If situations get heated, strict protocols guide the decision to seek outside help.
- <u>Convocation</u> is on June 6th and conversations are ongoing with student groups about safety and respect to minimize the risks of protests during the ceremony.
- There are many letters circulating to pressure the university to divest of investments that are linked to the war in Palestine. One such letter was written by the Art History Decolonial Action Group and signed by a few FoFA professors. The Dean will be meeting the group for a discussion next Tuesday.
- The Dean addressed a few of the statements that are circulating through these letters:
 - Tuition fees are not being invested in questionable assets. They are part of the operational budget, and they are not invested. It is donor funding that is invested.
 - The <u>Concordia University Fund</u> decided a few years back to <u>divest from fossil fuel and move its</u> <u>investments to socially and environmentally responsible funds.</u> The divestment process is meant to conclude in December 2024. A small fraction of problematic holdings remain.
 - The university does not invest funds in BMO. BMO manages the university's credit cards and the university has a line of credit with BMO, as with many other banks. Contracts are awarded through the tender process.
 - The students write that Concordia has censored them and that it has made it impossible for

- them to protest peacefully. The Dean is of the opinion that the university has been very accommodating and respectful of the students' right to protest during the last two strikes. She will be meeting with the students to find out if something may have happened that she is not aware of.
- Students are asking that Concordia impose a pro-palestine syllabus and stop all Israel-related research. The Dean will explain to the student group the importance of academic freedom and how it is supported by Québec law. The Dean was surprised to know that the letter was signed by several professors. She asked faculty members to keep these elements in mind should they be having conversations with students or should they receive these letters. The Dean is disheartened by the wrongful information that is circulating since this fosters division at a moment when everyone should be working together.
- The Dean suggests collaborating with the <u>Standing Together against Racism and Identity-based Violence STRIVE Task Force</u> as a good way to have a positive impact. The STRIVE Task Force is modeled on other task forces which have a strong Steering Committee and working groups that involve students, faculty and staff. STRIVE has a Steering Committee that is led by Co-Chairs Rilla Khaled, Rachel Berger and Lisa White and 6 subcommittees:
 - Antisemitism
 - Anti-Arab Racism and Islamophobia
 - Transphobia
 - Anti-Asian Racism
 - Campus Climate
 - Campus Engagement
- The Dean thanked the outgoing Chairs and welcomed the incoming Chairs:
 - Noah Drew is completing a 3-year term as Chair, Department of Theatre and Shauna Janssen is the incoming Chair.
 - John Potvin is completing a 3-year term as Chair, Department of Art History and Nicola Pezolet is the incoming Chair.
 - o Pippin Barr and Joshua Rager who were both Acting Chairs have been elected respectively as Chair, Department of Design and Computation Arts, and Chair, Department of Music.
 - Martin Lefebvre has renewed for a second mandate as the Chair, School of Cinema.
 - Vivek Venkatesh is stepping down as Chair, Department of Art Education, and is leaving
 Concordia for McGill. The nomination process to select a new department Chair, is ongoing.
- <u>Michèle Theriault</u> has retired as Director of the <u>Leonard & Bina Ellen Gallery</u> and <u>Pip Day</u> who is a fierce curator, known for her work at the <u>SBC Gallery of Contemporary Art</u> and for the projects and institutions she has led in Mexico, New York and Berlin, is the new Director.
- The Dean announced the two Fine Arts Honorary Doctorates who will be celebrated at Convocation:

Volt-Age the electrification research program which is supported by the \$123 million Canada First Research Excellence Fund, and which is based at Concordia, is meant to include disciplines across the University. The Associate Dean and members of FoFA met with Karim Zaghib, Principal Investigator, to start thinking of ways in which the FoFA Researchers can get involved in various funded projects. FoFA Researchers are encouraged to get involved at an early stage, particularly in the impact projects which will receive \$5 Million in funding. The Associate Dean will be sending out an email about a series of upcoming workshops on ways to participate.

Reducing budgets has an impact on workload, growth, funding and course and section offerings. It is challenging to know how best to apply these reductions. The Dean's Office has a number of initiatives ongoing to review our structural expenses for long term sustainability and using quantitative information for transparency and equity. Efforts are focused on minimizing impact to our core mission. Questions, feedback, and ideas should be directed to the Dean and Director. The Dean assured Council members that the university is committed to continuing to fund the Fine Arts and that the Faculty of Fine Arts is a beacon at Concordia.

<u>Convocation</u> is coming up and the Dean encouraged everyone to join. T. Khaner is to follow up about extending the invitation to join the ceremony, to the LTAs.

RESEARCH AND RESEARCH CREATION

SSHRC INSIGHT DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

Joana Joachim (Art History) *Stillness as Black Creative Practice* (\$50,514) is a two-year project that considers how stillness and quiet create the opportunity for sustainable Black creative practices in the Canadian context. It will investigate how Black cultural production emerges from quiet and stillness, in order to offer perspectives and pathways to sustainability within these creative practices. Particularly within the Canadian art milieu which enforces an untenable cycle of hyperproduction. This project will also develop guides and tools for creative replenishment which can support the practices and career trajectories of Black art professionals in Canada.

Joachim seeks to remedy a recurring and aggravating problematic in the Canadian art milieu wherein Black art professionals find themselves over-solicited for intense periods which are followed by intervals of extreme exhaustion and a lack of support. By investigating the career trajectories of Black artists during and after peaks of support in the Canadian art milieu *Stillness as Black Creative Practice* will critically consider the generative power of stillness, quiet and repose in Black creative practice within the context of striving for collective freedom. To halt the cycle of in(visibility) that the Canadian art institutions and Black communities find themselves in, a radical shift must take place.

With *Stillness as Black Creative Practice*, Joachim proposes that this change will emerge quietly, through stillness; that to yield to stillness and quiet is to restore to us the human dignity and right which have historically and continually been denied to us since the period of chattel slavery.

OFFICE OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT, RESEARCH AND GRADUATE STUDIES (OVPRGS) INTERNAL FUNDING

The Fall competitions for Aid to Research-Related Events (ARRE) and Facilities Optimization Program (FOP) were both launched in August, with an internal Fine Arts ConRAD deadline on Monday, September 16th at 9 am. Competition results will normally be announced by November 1st, 2024.

PETRO-CANADA YOUNG INNOVATOR AWARD (PCYIA)

Gabriel Vigliensoni (Design and Computation Arts): With a robust background spanning over two decades in electronic music and sound design, Assistant Professor Vigliensoni holds a prominent international reputation for his research and creative practice. His unique integration of creative artificial intelligence with sound composition bridges the gap between advanced computational methods and artistic expression, marked by a substantial publication record and a dynamic portfolio of creative works. Since joining the Faculty of Fine Arts' Department of Design and Computation Arts, Dr. Vigliensoni has swiftly assumed a significant role in departmental service, public engagement, and graduate mentorship. Dr. Gabriel Vigliensoni's proposed project, "Interactive Sound Futures: Exploring the Creative

Affordances of Game Engines for Sound and Music Generation," focuses on adapting procedural audio engines from game technologies for use by audio artists and composers. This repurposing, compiling, adaptation, and creation will open up new avenues for expression and storytelling in digital media. Currently, such access to these tools is fragmented and lacks comprehensive documentation; Dr. Vigliensoni plans to create new tools and compile existing tools into a structured format and provide extensive open-access documentation. This initiative directly addresses the gap in availability and usability of such technologies for creative audio design. Significant funding from the project is allocated to employing research assistants, thereby enhancing student learning opportunities and contributing robustly to the university's educational offerings.

CONCORDIA BLACK STUDENT EXCELLENCE DOCTORAL ENTRANCE AWARD

The School of Graduate Studies at Concordia University is deeply dedicated to promoting diversity within its doctoral programs, with a specific focus on enhancing the representation and active participation of Black communities.

In alignment with Concordia's ongoing initiatives to empower, mentor and comprehensively support emerging leaders in academia, SGS, in collaboration with each of the faculties, is pleased to offer the Concordia Black Student Excellence Doctoral Entrance Award. This new award aims to attract exceptionally qualified domestic applicants who self-identify as Black, providing them with financial support throughout their academic journey.

SUSAN JEANNE BRISCOE FELLOWSHIP 2024-25 (\$35,000)

The Fellowship was awarded to Emilie Lafleur, who completed her MA English – Creative Writing in June 2023. Over the course of the 2024–25 academic year, the Fellowship will provide financial support for her project "Now We're Ready to See," which explores the poetics of conspiracy theories. With a foundation in citational, research-based writing, Lafleur will consider grammars, including quantum language parse syntax and linguistic processes while exploring their cultural significance in contemporary discourse.

GOVERNOR GENERAL GOLD MEDAL (GGGM)

University Advancement Faculty of Fine Arts Development Update

1. Department Update

In July, Katie O'Keefe joined as FOFA's development coordinator, she will work on the team until December 2024. For budgetary reasons, the Development Office role, last occupied by Katia Lorye will continue to remain vacant for the time being.

2. Summary of gifts raised (FY25)

To date and with your help, we've raised approximately \$725,000 since the start of this fiscal year.

Barry Truax (Glenfraser Endowment) \$75k

The Truax Award in Electroacoustic Music is supported by the Glenfraser Concordia Endowment by Simon Fraser University Professor Emeritus Barry Truax and Dr. Guenther Krueger. The award is intended to provide financial support to one or more undergraduate or graduate students who have demonstrated excellence in electroacoustic music *composition* and research.

Barry Truax worked with R. Murray Schafer and the World Soundscape Project. He taught courses on sound, audio, and electroacoustic music for 40 years, and directed the Sonic Research Studio. As a composer, he is renowned for his PODX computer music system works and multi-channel soundscape compositions, with over 600 performances worldwide. Barry is a founding member of several organizations including the International Confederation of Electroacoustic Music, the World Forum for Acoustic Ecology, and the Canadian Electroacoustic Community. He has authored books and articles spanning acoustic communication, soundscape analysis, electroacoustic composition, and acoustic ecology.

II. Mitchell Pressworks (Claude Truman Mitchell Press Award) \$32K value in-kind

Printing press award to a student in Print Media. The purpose of the Award is to reward a high-achieving graduating student in Print Media with a Gift, namely a custom steel press to assist them in their professional path as a print-based artist. The Award recipient will be named annually, and the Gift will be made available to that recipient at the end of the academic year.

III. Kevin Austin (exceptional contributions to EAST Awards)

Through the exceptional dedication and generosity of Prof Kevin Austin and his Electroacoustics Endowment, 28 music students received scholarships this year. Kevin continues to grow his Endowment Fund and made an exceptional additional contribution this year in order to create even more awards.

IV. Louise Chagnon-Bucheit (Fonds Mianna Art Volt) \$30k

As a strong believer in Art Volt, Louise has agreed to support the program's continued initiatives. Launched in 2020, the Art Volt program at the University aims to provide recent Fine Arts graduates with practical knowledge and skills covering a broad spectrum of topics specific to different practices. Offered in collaboration with partners of the Cultural Consortium (art institutions and other organizations) these programs also aim to promote networking opportunities.

V. Complexe du Canal Lachine (Natalie Voland) (<u>Lachine Canal Studios</u> renewed for a year) approximately \$25K

A shared studio space opened in 2021 for artists and researchers in the Humanities PhD and the Individualized MA and PhD programs in support of their research-creation projects. Research interests range from material culture and craft history to filmmaking, virtual reality technology and the aesthetics of sound. The space accommodates a vast array of research and practice, with individual studio spaces offered to students for long-term research and artistic production and common spaces available for temporary use or collaborative activities.

VI. Sari Hornstein (Community outreach fund for CATs department) \$450K

\$450,000 to support Creative Arts Therapies. CAT recognizes and fosters the creativity of autistic, disabled, and neurodivergent individuals through the arts and community organizations with the help of student interns. Its aim is to champion inclusive community-building possibilities through the arts, augmenting the opportunities and inclusion of its often-excluded participants

VII. Hewitt Foundation (redesignation of funds towards the Master Printmaker program) \$300K

To stand out as the top printmaking program in Canada and to enhance our students' experience, a Master Printmaker Program will complement our existing print media expertise. The program will help students develop practical arts and career skills, promote the work of prestigious artists and result in high-quality Canadian artworks for museums and collectors. Concordia will be the only university in Canada to offer such an experience to students. The program

purchases a printing press, hosts a master printmaker in residence and brings a worldclass artist to Montreal.

VIII. Anonymous Donor (gift in-kind to Cinema School) \$160K

Anonymous donation of camera equipment to the department to help students with their studies and with film production.

IX. Doggone Foundation (redesignation of funds to support Art Volt) \$65K

The Doggone Foundation continues their generous support of the Faculty by gifting \$65,000 to be put towards Art Volt. These funds will offset operational costs for the program.

X. Bronfman Fellowship (renewing in September) Total value of renewal TBD

We are renewing the Bronfman Fellowship and hoping to raise the stipend amount to reflect inflation and Montreal's standard of living.

XI. Judith and Nora Peach (Martin Peach Memorial Award for Electronic Arts) \$32k

Judith and Nora Peach, respectively sister and mother of the late Martin Peach, made a combined donation of \$32,000 to the Martin Peach Memorial Award for Electronic Arts, in the Studio Arts Intermedia area.

Martin was a greatly beloved and respected technician in Concordia's Intermedia program in the Department of Studio Arts. The Martin Peach Memorial Award for Electronic Arts will support a student studying Intermedia Studio Arts at Concordia. Martin was committed to providing emerging artists the help and support needed to achieve their artistic goals.
