1. Call to Order

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.

- 2. Approval of the Agenda MOTION: (M. Lefebvre / E. Cheasley Paterson) "that the agenda for the meeting of December 13, 2024, be approved."

4. Business Arising from the Minutes of November 15, 2024

- At the November Faculty Council, a document containing testimonies from CUCCR users and other information about CUCCR usage was delivered to the Dean, by the Sustainability of the Fine Arts committee (SoFA), with a request to pass it on to Environmental Health and Safety (EHS). The Dean informed Council that the document has been passed on and discussions with EHS are ongoing, in the hopes of finding solutions to maintain CUCCR activities are ongoing.
- The 50th edition of Concordia's Centraide campaign has now ended. The goal of \$200,000 has been surpassed by 15k, thanks to the generosity of the Concordia community and the efforts of all volunteers. The Dean thanked everyone who contributed, in one way or another, to this very important cause.

5. Chair's Remarks

- On December 5, the Québec government adopted <u>Bill 74</u>, which gives the province more power to restrict international students' entry in Québec as of next year. This is not unique to Québec and follows the federal legislation. The troubling aspect of the bill is that the government intends to determine international students' ability to enroll at certain colleges and universities based on unknown criteria, that might include region, programs, language, cohort size, labour needs and what Jean-François Roberge, Minister of Immigration, Francization and Integration, describes as "government priorities". The Dean hopes to find out more about what these criteria will be, perhaps as soon as next week.
- The hearing for the lawsuit Concordia has launched against the Québec government begins on Monday, December 16. The University expects the court to release its decision in March 2025.

- Some good news: The University is on target with the deficit recovery plan that was approved by the Ministère de l'éducation supérieure and the Board of Governors. So, it is confident that it will be compliant this year and will therefore avoid sanctions. Everyone across the University is participating in the deficit recovery plan, with a larger share being shouldered by the services, rather than in the academic sector (Advancement, Facilities, Financial Services, etc...). This was a decision made by the University. The Dean thanked everyone who participated. The departments made great efforts to ensure that the student experience be affected as little as possible.
- Some less good news: registrations have been consistently down for the past 3 years and there is worry about the 2025-2026 registrations. There are many reasons for this, the situation with international students, which is affecting Concordia and every university across Canada, and Canada's reputation, coming out of Covid, the specifics of the economic situation, all of which have had different impacts at different times. When there is a bad year for registrations, 3-4 more bad years follow until the cohort of students graduates. In order to maintain its financial position, 1000 more new students, above this year's numbers, will need to be registered next year, across the University. The Dean is having conversations with the departments to see where capacity for growth in programs is possible.
- Although the numbers are pretty good in most of the Fine Arts departments, the Dean reminded everyone
 that we are all interdependent as a University, as a Faculty and as departments. The Dean thanked everyone
 for their sustained recruitment efforts and those working on programmes and on removing barriers for
 entry into programmes. She encouraged departments to admit students as early as possible, in consultation
 with our Student Academic Services team.
- The University thinks that the indexation of university funding by the government will likely be less than
 inflation or salary increases. The newspapers talk about cuts to Santé Québec budgets, infrastructure cuts,
 and so on, and we can conclude that the government will have the same approach for education. In
 January, Anne Whitelaw and Denis Cossette will hold their annual budget roadshow. The Dean encourages
 everyone to ttend to get a fuller picture of the situation. By then, more will be known about the projections
 for next year.

- Board and Senate

December 12 Board of Governors meeting:

The Dean shared a few items from the meeting that some might be interested in looking into:

- Student fee levies: Following a referendum held in November 2024, the undergraduate students voted in favor of certain fee levies and the same are being presented to the Board of Governors for approval.
- Group insurance plans modifications: There will be minor modifications to the plans and Council members can look at the documents for details.
- The Environmental Health & Safety team submitted a report on compliance with environmental legislation and health and safety regulations.

The next Board of Governors meeting is on February 6.

Senate:

The <u>Senate</u> meets on December 13 in the afternoon and the Dean will report at the next meeting.

- Other news:

<u>Concordia Chancellor Jonathan Wener</u>, who some may have encountered through his flamboyant participation in the Convocation, is stepping down as Chancellor on December 31st, at the conclusion of his second term. He will be succeeded in the role by <u>Gina Cody</u>.

<u>Tim Evans is Concordia's new Vice-President, Research, Innovation and Impact</u>. He is a highly accomplished scientist, educator, and research and policy leader in the field of global health. He joins us from McGill University, where he served in three roles simultaneously: Director of the McGill School of Population and Global Health; Associate-Dean in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Science; and as the university's Associate Vice-President (Global Policy and Innovation). The Dean had the opportunity to meet Tim Evans

and to speak with him about the Faculty of Fine Arts and the specificity of what the faculty does. He was very interested, and she thinks he will be a great ally. Council members will have a chance to meet him when he does the rounds of Faculty Councils.

- Concordia University Press recently published <u>Concordia University at 50: A Collective History</u>, edited by Monika Kin Gagnon and Brandon Webb, with Steven High, Catherine Wild and Jason Camelot. Fifty contributions from faculty, staff, students and alumni present stories of a vibrant community and its activities in a multilayered collection of professional and personal reflections, essays and oral histories conducted with participants and observers of key events. The book is enriched with colourful archival documents, photographs and public artworks that grace the university's campuses. Copies of the book will be available on the <u>Concordia University Press</u> website and at the <u>Concordia Bookstore</u>. The book is being translated into French. The Dean gave a shout out to Catherine Wild and the editorial team and to Catherine McKenzie who wrote a great piece about the Faculty of Fine Arts, which is well represented in the book. Several other members contributed stories: Joanne Sloan, Jason Lewis and Skawennati, Lynn Hughes, Alice Jim, Silvy Panet-Raymond, Kevin Austin and Anne Whitelaw.
- Last night a group of Concordia <u>music students from the Jazz program were playing at Place des arts</u> in the context of a partnership that invites emerging musicians to perform at the <u>Salon urbain</u>. The music event, a <u>5 à 7</u> formula with a bar, is free for the public. It was a very proud moment for the Dean who had great fun and found the music students to be amazing! Other students are playing this evening and on Saturday, December 14. <u>Additional performances are scheduled for April</u>.
- The Dean concluded her remarks, by mentioning that in spite of the budget and legal challenges we face, the Faculty of Fine Arts and the University have not changed, we still have great programs and FoFA's programs are getting better through everyone's excellent work. We are conducting amazing research, we have great people: students, faculty and staff, that form a community that the Dean is really proud to be part of.
- The Dean recognized the efforts everyone is making and she encouraged everyone to work on what they can actually control. She reminded them that there is a need in Québec, and in the world, for a Faculty of Fine Arts like ours, with its diverse perspectives, with its quirky programs, and with its very particular take on research and research-creation.

- The Associate Dean highlighted the call for the Distinguished Teaching Awards. She encouraged faculty members to nominate those they consider to be deserving of the award and she is hopeful that there will be several nominations.

The Associate Dean shared an optimistic correction to her report. The Faculty will be hiring 5 (not 4) new faculty members to help departments with unexpected faculty departures. The 5th position is a Department of Music hire. She thanked the Dean for her advocacy and support. Part of the process of hiring new faculty is the access to public talks and input from the community. She encouraged everyone to contribute to the process by attending talks. Invitations to the talks are forthcoming.

9. Presentations

Quebec's New Privacy Law and Overview of Requirements

Guests Andrea Black, Senior Analyst, Compliance, University Secretariat and Gabriel Desjardins, Coordinator, Administration, University Secretariat, presented on Québec's new privacy law. They gave an overview of what's new under the <u>Act respecting access to documents held by public bodies and the protection of personal</u> <u>information</u>, of the University's legal requirements and responsibilities, of the employees' role in protecting personal information.

The law is new and the Privacy Office is seeking legal counsel to ensure that the University has a risk-adjusted approach to its different practices. Conversation with the Director, Campus Safety and Prevention Services and with the Special Advisor to the Provost

Guests Darren Dumoulin, Director, Campus Safety and Prevention Services and Marc Lafrance, Associate Professor, Sociology and Anthropology and Special Advisor to the Provost spoke to Council members about the University's approach to campus safety and prevention services, training for agents, and the initiatives it has taken to foster dialogue and provide resources to the campus community.

- The role of the Special Advisor to the Provost is to rebuild trust eroded by tensions on campus, through a thoughtful, deliberate and compassionate approach, serving as an active listening soundboard for all of the university's constituents, supporting the Dean of Students in student-facing work, providing confidential space for discussion and advice to faculty members and staff, and correcting misconceptions where relevant.
- Security went through a transformation and name change to <u>Campus Safety and Prevention Services</u> two years ago that was partly driven by recommendations from the <u>President's Task Force on Anti-Black Racism</u>. Darren Dumoulin, who has been with the University for 30 years, has been the Director, CSPS since its inception.
- The CSPS provides training courses for Concordia individuals to deal with emergency situations:
 - Emergency preparedness
 - First aid & CPR training
 - o Concordia Emergency Response Team (CERT) training
 - De-escalation training for frontline staff
 - Online training courses
- Faculty members can reach out to <u>Brigitte Boutet</u>, Emergency Preparedness Manager or <u>Viviane Namaste</u> from the <u>Simone de Beauvoir Institute & Womens Studies</u>, to enquire about de-escalation training for faculty.
- The CSPS has a process for Concordia individuals to provide feedback, file a complaint and report an incident and they can chose to do so anonymously. The links to the forms can be found at the bottom of the <u>CSPS</u> webpage:
 - o <u>Questions, comments or concerns? Feedback form.</u>
 - <u>Complaint or compliment for a security agent form.</u>
 - <u>Report an incident to Campus Safety and Prevention Services form.</u>

Customer service, and procedural complaints are addressed internally by the Director of CSPS and remain confidential. Complaints concerning code of conduct involve the <u>Office of Rights and Responsibilities (ORR)</u> and are dealt with through well-established protocols and procedures.

- The CSPS posts <u>incident summaries</u> under the News & Tips tab at the top of its <u>webpage</u>, to provide clarity and context where misinformation or misconception about certain incidents might be circulating on campus.
- Complaints can also be directed to the Ombuds Office.
- <u>Marc Lafrance</u> encouraged those who want to have conversations or share ideas for actionable solutions, to reach out to him.
- <u>Rachel Berger</u> invites students to reach out to <u>Standing Together against Racism and Identity-based Violence</u> <u>STRIVE</u> about any concerns or complaints.

10. Questions

A faculty member questioned the examinations regulation as stated in <u>Section 16.3.7 Examinations (I. Final</u> <u>Examinations, point 12 of the Undergraduate Calendar</u>, and considers it to be incompatible with the way certain FoFA programs do their assessments. The Dean agrees that the rationale doesn't correspond with the reality of FoFA and she and the Associate Dean, Programs and Pedagogy have brought it up for discussion in the hope that the language can be adapted to better suit FoFA programs.

UPDATE ON THE NEW TRI-AGENCY NARRATIVE CV IMPLEMENTATION

SSHRC (as well as NSERC, and CIHR) are transitioning to a narrative-style CV, replacing the Canadian Common CV, for funding applications, beginning with the 2025 Impact Awards and expanding to all opportunities as they are integrated into the new Tri-Agency Grants Management Solution (TGMS).

The narrative CV allows researchers to

- provide a personal statement outlining their expertise, collaborations, societal impact, and recognitions;
- highlight up to 10 significant contributions, such as publications, datasets, creative works, EDI advancements, and community engagement; and
- describe mentorship and supervisory activities, including the creation of inclusive research environments.

Further details and the required template are available on the SSHRC website, with instructions provided in each funding call.

CANADA GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP – MASTER'S (CGS M) 2025-26

The objective of the <u>Canada Graduate Scholarships – Master's (CGS M</u>) program is to help develop research skills and assist in the training of highly qualified personnel by supporting students who demonstrate a high standard of achievement in undergraduate and early graduate studies. This year the annual value of the award increased to \$27,000 for 12 months, non-renewable.

Timeline and deadlines:

- December 1, 2024: Student application deadline.
